Hours, dollars, time add up quickly

The Grand Lodge Government Relations Committee involves more than monitoring and lobbying legislation in our states and districts. Do you know tracking and reporting all of the hours and money donated to our charitable programs has many benefits to our organization and is an integral part of this committee?

Sustaining our vital programs is not optional. By retaining our current tax status we are able to operate at a much better rate. A much higher percentage of every dollar ends up going to our charity programs rather than taxes. Yes, it does take some time to fill out the Charity Reporting form, but not submitting these reports can result in service and funding cuts, and make our programs more difficult to sustain.

Sadly, estimates indicate only about half of the work being performed by

our Members actually get reported. Do not assume your state and its Lodges are tracking your events. You might be missing your chance to contribute to the reports. To share the reporting task, have each committee chairperson and/or officer fill out a report on every event at your Lodge, then give it to the Lodge Government Relations Chairperson or Lodge Secretary for monthly reporting. Charitable reporting includes volunteer hours and travel as well as monetary donations. Hours add up quickly no matter how many Members and guests help at an event. Share with your Members and volunteers and explain the importance of logging their hours. A few minutes of their time after an event will help immensely.

Lodge Secretaries and State Committee Chairpersons are great sources for the forms necessary to complete. The Charity Records Workbook can be accessed here: elks.org/leadership/manuals.cfm.



Elks National Foundation ~ Our Legacy to the Future

In 1928, one man's dream became a reality for all Elks and the communities we serve. Then-National President John F. Malley envisioned a plan that would "unite the forces of the Order into a mighty army for the service of mankind." During the annual Grand Lodge Convention in Miami that year, Malley's call to service inspired delegates to take action by voting to establish the Elks National Foundation with an initial \$100,000 grant. More than 90 years after Malley shared his vision with the Order, the ENF continues to unite all Elks in service to their communities.

How the ENF Works

The ENF is able to help Elks build stronger communities thanks to contributions from our generous donors. Since inception, we have received more than \$288.7 million in contributions and bequests. Today, we have more than 124,000 active donors and an endowment fund valued at \$751.5 million. A board of seven trustees, who are all past national presidents of the Order, governs the ENF, which is located at the Elks national headquarters in the Elks Veterans Memorial in Chicago. The director, Jim O'Kelley, oversees the administration of the ENF's day-to-day operations. The ENF also has volunteers at the Lodge, district and state levels who help coordinate our fundraising strategy and implement our programs. Thanks to the ongoing support of our donors, the ENF continues to expand on Malley's vision, mobilizing Elks across the country into a force for positive change.

WHAT: The Elks National Foundation (ENF), is the charitable arm of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks (B.P.O.E.) supporting Youth, serving Veterans, and meeting the needs of local community projects in Elks communities just like Calabash, NC.

HOW: Members of local Elks Lodges, and others, make voluntary, tax-deductible cash donations to the ENF. (The Elks National Foundation is a 501 c3 Public Charity) Then, throughout each fiscal year, the fund provides Grant Money to those lodges who qualify by having their members make enough donations to meet the Grand Lodge's donation Per-Capita (each Person/Member) threshold. Additional Grants are obtainable through a rigid application process. Additionally, the ENF provides scholarships each year to applicants who are the Children, or Grandchildren, of Elks members. Throughout the years, the Calabash Elks Lodge has received over a "Hundred-Thousand Dollars" in ENF Grant money. Since our Lodge's inception in 1984, combining ENF Grants with locally raised funds, the Calabash Elks Lodge has donated over \$300,000 in Goods and Services, as well as Cash, to various local Charities and Charitable Causes in our community. This is why it is important for our members to donate what they can to the ENF. The Calabash Elks Lodge always places at, or near the Top of, all the Elks lodges in North Carolina when it comes to making donations to the ENF, and always - "Reaping what We Sow!"

Veterans Affairs Committee - #2679 Calabash, NC

The Veteran's Affairs Committee (VAC) is pleased to announce that John Zschoche, known as "John Z", has assumed the position of Vice Chairman. He replaces Jerry Kimble who "retired" as co-chairman in April.

The VAC is continuing its efforts to support the Veterans Welcome Home and Resource Center's Tiny Home project to provide housing for homeless veterans. The 26 Tiny Homes, some shown below, are on track to open in early September and there are over 40 qualified "homeless" veterans on the waiting list. Although the VAC did not get the Freedom Grant to provide mini-refrigerators for the homes, we had VAC members—who choose to remain anonymous—donate 20 mini-refrigerators at a cost of almost \$2,500. Their generosity and dedication to helping homeless veterans is a model for all of us. The VAC also has a team, led by Linda T'May, working to provide welcome home kits for the Tiny Homes. Linda has coordinated with the VWHRC to identify items needed for the Tiny Homes and has received approval for the items from the Elks National Foundation (ENF). ENF will fund five \$300 kits that the VAC Welcome Home Kit committee will deliver in late August.

The VAC is well under way in preparing for our major fund-raising activity for 2023. Led by Donna Kozlowski and her team, we are hard at work preparing for our 20th Annual Mini-Golf-A-Rama and Live Charity Auction on September 30th. Did Ya Know?

Obviously, we all know what an important role our Charity Bingo plays in our Lodge and Community. Why if it wasn't for Bingo Tom Ditzler wouldn't be parked in the "Elk of the Year" spot. There may however be a few things maybe even Tom doesn't know about this "All American Game" and maybe you too, SO . . . **Did Ya Know?**

The game's history can be traced back to 1530, to an Italian lottery called "Lo Giuoco del Lotto D'Italia," which is still played every Saturday in Italy. From Italy, the game was introduced to France in the late 1770s, where it was called "Le Lotto", a game played among wealthy Frenchmen. The Germans also played a version of the game in the 1800s, but they used it as a child's game to help students learn math, spelling, and history.

In the U.S., bingo was originally called "beano". It was a country fair game where a dealer would select numbered discs from a cigar box and players would mark their cards with beans. They yelled "beano" if they won.

Edwin S. Lowe and the Bingo Card

When the game reached North America in 1929, it became known as "beano". It was first played at a carnival near Atlanta, Georgia. New York toy salesman Edwin S. Lowe renamed it "bingo" after he overheard someone accidentally yell "bingo" instead of "beano."

He hired a Columbia University math professor, Carl Leffler, to help him increase the number of combinations in bingo cards. By 1930, Leffler had invented 6,000 different bingo cards. They were developed so there would be fewer non-repeating number groups and conflicts when more than one person got Bingo at the same time.

Lowe was a Jewish immigrant from Poland. Not only did his E.S. Lowe company produce bingo cards, but he also developed and marketed the game Yahtzee, for which he bought the rights from a couple who played it on their yacht. His company was sold to Milton Bradley in 1973 for \$26 million. Lowe died in 1986.

Church Bingo

A Catholic priest from Pennsylvania approached Lowe about using bingo as a means of raising church funds. When bingo started being played in churches it became increasingly popular. By 1934, an estimated 10,000 bingo games were played weekly. While gambling is banned in many states, they may allow bingo games to be hosted by churches and non-profit groups to raise funds.

Casino Bingo

Bingo has been one of the games offered at many casinos, both in Nevada and those operated by Native American tribes. E.S. Lowe built a casino hotel on the Las Vegas Strip, the Tallyho Inn. Today, more than \$90 million dollars are spent on bingo each week in North America alone.

Bingo in Retirement and Nursing Homes

Bingo is a popular game played for recreational therapy and socialization in skilled nursing facilities and retirement homes. It is easy to operate with just a couple of staff or volunteers, and residents can play along with their visitors. The opportunity to win a small prize is a lure. Its popularity may wane once the elderly population who enjoyed church bingo in their youth pass on to new generations raised on video games.

An old married couple were playing bingo, it was the Jackpot game "The Coverall". The old man kept looking over his wife's shoulder saying, "You've got that number, mark it off, you've got that number, mark it off." After putting up with him for some time, the old woman got annoyed and said angrily, "Why don't you look at your own damn sheet?" The old man replied, "I can't, it's full!"


