Message from State President Frank Brady

Grand Lodge Convention Report

A new year, a new day for Elksdom! After a year of loss of our members due to Covid-19, Elks showed up with enthusiasm and large numbers. The Credentials Committee announced that 6,672 Elks and guests attended the opening ceremony. On Sunday afternoon, the Convention convened with the Scottish Pipes and Drums escorting the First Responders flag to the podium, with the State Presidents then presenting their state flags. I was so very proud to have walked and waved our NC state flag with my friend, Past State President (2020-2021), John Bullock, beside me. GER, Paul R. Ryan, delivered the key note speech, while Past GER, Malcolm McPherson, handled the introductions and delivered the closing remarks. At the end of the session, the crowd was treated to entertainment by the lively band, the Party Crashers.

During this session, the Elks National Foundation announced that its Most Valuable Student Scholarship Awards went to Gellila Asmamaw and Jacob Lockman, who each won scholarships of \$50,000. ENF, for 2021-2022, allocated \$2.9 million to fund the MVS Scholarship Program, which includes 500 4-year scholarships ranging from \$4,000 to \$50,000.

ENF also announced the 2019-2020 (delayed) Hoop Shoot winners: Caden Thompson (boys) and Ellison Graham (girls). ENF has allocated \$1.1 million to fund the Hoop Shoot Program for 2021-2022.

Monday's business session was opened by GER, Paul R. Ryan. The ENF Per Member Contest winners were announced by Division. Division II, ranging from 301-500 members: Raleigh Lodge #735 took third place with \$36.11 per member, for a total donation of \$13,757.50. Congratulations, Raleigh!

The Grand Lodge Activities Committee announced its Community Project Contest winners by Division. Division I, ranging from 0-300 members: New Bern Lodge #767 received first place; Roxboro Lodge #2005 received second place; and Shallotte Lodge #2854 received third place. In Division III, ranging from 501-700 members, Hickory Lodge #1654 received second place. Way to go North Carolina!

The Grand Lodge Fraternal Committee announced its State Bulletin Contest winners. North Carolina and Ashley Buckwell, Editor, received the coveted Five Star rating. Congratulations, Ashley!

Tuesday's business session was opened by GER, Paul R. Ryan. First business of the session was to elect T. Keith Mills from Caldwell, ID Lodge #1448, as Grand Exalted Ruler for 2021-2022. The new GER spoke of his vision for the order which encompasses his theme, Meeting the Challenge. He and his wife, Amy, are looking forward to visiting all of the State Associations this coming year.

There were 15 proposed resolutions to be voted on; and nine passed. Details will be addressed by the Exalted Rulers of each lodge.

Wednesday's business session was opened by GER, T. Keith Mills, where he encouraged exalted rulers to be active in national programs that change the lives of those in their communities, i.e., youth activities; veterans services; and drug awareness. He also encouraged lodge leaders to use new electronic tools; and to take full advantage of the many ENF grants for which their lodge may be eligible.

The Grand Lodge Fraternal Committee Chairman, Robert Hinkle, from Virginia, congratulated the winners of the 2020-2021 Americanism Essay Contest. Division I – Eliza Corday from Winston-Salem Lodge #449. Hinkle announced that the theme of the 2021-2022 essay will be 'What Does It Mean to Love Your Country?'"

In closing, the Tampa Grand Lodge Convention was a total success, from the sound of the opening gavel until the end. The North Carolina delegates attended every session; and I felt proud that all of the chairs allocated to us on the convention floor were filled—a total of over 70 North Carolinians made the trip to attend. I think all of us will agree that our NC Hospitality Suite was awesome. Many thanks to John and Cheryl Lawrence for all of their hard work and dedication in giving us 'a home away from home'. It takes many hours of planning, shopping, transporting and organizing to set up a successful Hospitality Suite; and we owe John and Cheryl a round of applause.

Message From Grand Exalted Ruler Keith Mills



Elks keep moving forward and Meeting the Challenge Wow, what a fantastic opportunity to serve our great Order. I would like to first thank my wonderful wife, Amy. Without her love, support, and commitment this experience would not be possible. We both are very grateful to have been chosen to take this incredible journey. I would also like to thank my other family members. Knowing they are helping take care of our personal obligations at home during this time is a huge help to both of us. My theme this year is “Meeting the Challenge.” This past year was like no other in the history of our Order. With the ongoing COVID-19 situation, I want to congratulate local Boards of Directors and members for their efforts in continuing Lodge operations and remaining active in their community. Thank you for taking and showing pride in our Order. Not only could we not meet regularly, but

we all experienced a crash course in virtual meetings. Summer is still upon us, but fall is closing in. Now is the time to begin planning Lodge fall activities. For example, begin working on a school supply program, or start one if one is not available in your community. This is an opportunity to engage with your schools, help children who need it by providing critical school supplies, and lay the groundwork for other Elks youth programs (e.g., Hoop Shoot, scholarships, drug awareness). This year, my goal for Elks National Foundation will remain at \$4.80 per Member. I know this goal is easily obtainable since we have more than doubled this number for many years now. The stronger your Lodge, the greater benefit to your community.

With the various grants from the Elks National Foundation, we can readily add to existing Community Service Projects. Today, our communities need us more than ever. There are always projects that could use our help to strengthen the charitable works we do. For some ENF Grants, your Lodge just needs to apply. Others are competitive. However, ENF personnel are there to assist you with these proposals. The Elks Most Valuable Student applications are now open and online. Create a little explanation sheet or download one from elks.org. Then call your high school counselors to inform them of our program and where they can direct their seniors for the eligibility requirements and application. Follow up that call with a small letter. Remember we also have the Student/Teenager Month and Year Program. This is one way for your Lodge to recognize high school students for their work and volunteerism. Look into this program within the Grand Lodge Youth Activities Program Manual. Finally, this week, visit Elks.org. Under the Fraternal Committee, print off the “Patriotism Week Proclamation.” Have your city mayor sign it to proclaim September 6-12, 2021 as National Patriotism Week in your town. Then, use this opportunity to encourage new Members to join our great Order.

New Bern Lodge Aids in Bringing “Wall That Heals” to New Bern

The Wall that Heals started its 2021 Tour in our very own city of New Bern (8-11April) thanks to the tireless efforts of Chairman George Halyak of American Legion Post 539 and the Knights of Columbus Father Kenneth Parker Assembly 1820, along with volunteers from sixteen other veteran's organizations, to include members of the New Bern Elks Lodge.

The Vietnam Veteran's 3/4 scale Replica Wall and mobile museum spreads the history of the memorial located in our nation's capitol and relates the historical impact of the Vietnam War.

Our community raised fifty thousand dollars to cover the expenses of bringing this significant Memorial to our area. After thirty thousand dollars in expenses, one thousand dollars was given to each of the eighteen volunteer organizations to continue their work with our local Veterans. An additional one thousand five hundred dollars was given to the New Bern Elks Lodge to be dedicated to the welfare of those living in the Kinston Veteran's Home.

Morehead City Beaufort Elks Bless the Fleet

Small acts, when multiplied by millions of people, can transform the world. It is those little bits of doing good where you are that begins the change for a community. On this side of the Covid-19 pandemic, Jane and Bob McClughan, along with lots of other members of the Elks Lodge in Morehead City, wanted to do something good for their community. Since 1868, millions and millions of Americans have joined the Elks. They bring so much to their communities.

With the mission of honoring their community, Jane said, "We all thought that 'The Blessing of the Fleet' would be a great project to raise the spirits of our community and to honor our commercial and leisure fishermen who bring tourism to Carteret County. I am so proud to be a part of it all." The Elks Lodge chartered the Carolina Princess to be in the 'blessing fleet.' Many children and their families were able to be on the boat, and all the children were supplied a backpack. Mayor Jerry Jones opened with comments, and Arnold Baldwin sang the National Anthem. Rev. Karl Zorowski, the pastor of St. Peter's United Methodist Church in Morehead City, said the opening prayer, followed by the song Eternal Father, Strong to Save, sung by his daughter Aspen. This song is a mariner's hymn written in the 1860s and is known as the Navy Hymn. Psalm 107:23.31 was read and then began the ceremony of Laying of the Wreath. Rev. Zorowski said, "We remember now those who have gone out upon the waters and not returned safely to port. Gracious Lord, we thank you for their lives which were shared with others on this earth for a time; and for their loved ones, we offer a prayer for comfort, peace, mercy and grace." As the boats processed, the blessing was stowed upon them. "Creator and Father of all, we pray for those who go down to the sea in ships and serve you upon the waters of the world. Bless them and those who serve their needs, that they may put their whole trust in you and find in you a strong anchor for their hopes, and so be filled with your peace, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Bless these boats and all who sail upon them. Give the captains and crews presence of mind in danger, and guide them as they keep these vessels in good repair. Grant them the wisdom of knowing when to go out and when to stay put, so that they may have a safe passage. May everyone who ventures upon the waters in these boats be renewed in spirit through their encounter with the beauty of our Creator's handiwork. Amen."
